Protecting Sexual Privacy In The Internet Age: The Rise Of Revenge Porn And How To Stop It

The expression, “Nothing disappears from the Internet” is particularly haunting for victims of “revenge porn.” Revenge porn is a form of online harassment that involves the posting of sexually explicit images or videos without consent, often by a vengeful ex-partner. The results are swift and devastating: widespread exposure of a person's most intimate moments to family, friends, peers, and strangers leading to humiliation, harassment, and the loss of employment or educational opportunities. This presentation will provide an overview of the problem and offer suggestions for protecting sexual privacy in the Internet age.

Professor Mary Anne Franks is the Associate Professor of Law for the University of Miami School of Law. Before joining the Miami Law faculty, Professor Franks was a Bigelow Fellow and Lecturer in Law at the University of Chicago Law School. She received her J.D. from Harvard Law School in 2007. She received her D.Phil in 2004 and her M.Phil in 2001 from Oxford University, where she studied on a Rhodes Scholarship.

Before she began teaching law, Professor Franks taught courses in social theory and philosophy at Harvard University, and also worked as a Senior Consultant for a negotiation consulting firm.

She currently teaches family law, criminal law, and criminal procedure. Her other research and teaching interests include cyberlaw, discrimination, free speech, and law and gender.
