The Home Foreclosure Legal Aid Project

In response to the growing home foreclosure crisis in Washington State, the Washington State Bar Association, in partnership with the Northwest Justice Project, is developing a well-trained "army" of volunteer lawyers who have agreed to provide pro bono representation to homeowners with foreclosure related legal problems. The statewide project will last for one year - from June 1, 2009, through May 31, 2010 - and will serve those whose income is up to 400 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. Recruitment of volunteer lawyers began in May and the WSBA continues to need and recruit lawyers for the project. New U.S. Supreme Court Nominee

On May 26, 2009, President Obama nominated Judge Sonia Sotomayor to replace Justice Souter on the United States Supreme Court. Research specialists at the <u>Law Library</u> <u>of Congress</u> have compiled a selection of resources including articles and books by Sotomayor, Congressional documents, cases, and web resources. In addition, the Georgetown Law Library has updated its <u>Supreme Court Nominations Research Guide</u> to include resources on Judge Sotomayor. This guide also has extensive information on the nomination and confirmation process.

New Edition of Methods of Practice

The Washington State Law Library will retain all copies of the fourth edition in its collection in order to provide access to this unique material which will no longer be available on Westlaw.

Washington Women's Suffrage Centennial Exhibit – This exhibit premiered at the Washington State History Museum on February 28, 2009, and continues through September 27, 2009. It highlights the history of the struggle to attain women's right to vote in Washington State and illuminates how women's voting has influenced territorial and state history. The exhibit is co-curated by the Washington State Historical Society, the Women's History Consortium and the Northwest Museum of Arts & Culture.

Budget cuts – Due to a reduction in its publications budget, the Washington State Law Library has cut its collection of law reviews by 98 percent. It will rely on electronic databases such as HeinOnline for future coverage with the exception of Yale, Harvard, Stanford, Seattle University, Gonzaga, and Washington law reviews, which will remain in print. Patrons can access HeinOnline in the library or ask library staff to email them articles.
