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1 **1. INTRODUCTION**

2 I, Kyla Estes, am making this reply brief to the respondent declaration/respondents brief.
3 The respondents brief does not contain any legal argument or cite case law that diminishes
4 the appellant’s argument but rather the respondent gives a declaration of hearsay verbiage
5 and claims of inaccuracies.

6 The claims that Mr. LaVoi makes that he was not properly served any and all documents
7 pertaining to this case is also another inaccuracy on his behalf. He was properly served and
8 all documentation of the services have been accurately filed with both the trial court and the
9 court of appeals.

10 The claims that Mr. LaVoi make alleging that the appellant flagrantly attempted to
11 withhold Lance from him to obstruct his father/son bond is an error on his behalf. Mr. LaVoi
12 has violated the parenting plan signed off by the trial judge October 31, 2013 by withholding
13 Lance for protracted periods of time, October 3, 2013 to January 18, 2014 and again March
14 1, 2014 until April 5, 2014. The trial court erred in not granting Ms. Estes contempt motions
15 for Mr. LaVoi withholding Lance from Ms. Estes for protracted periods of time. The trial
16 court also erred in not granting make-up time for the length of time Mr. LaVoi withheld
17 Lance from her.

18 I, Kyla Estes am also asking the courts to look at the full picture of this parenting plan,
19 the trial court did not take the minor child, Lance into account in this parenting plan but
20 instead the trial court made this into a mockery of how badly an abusive man can manipulate
21 the system to continue his abuse towards his victim by using the minor child as a pawn for
22 his continued abuse.

23 Mr. LaVoi makes allegations and assumptions that Ms. Estes has never participated in a
24 psychological evaluation. This is highly inaccurate; Ms. Estes has had numerous

1 psychological evaluations which have all been filed with the trial court (sub 415), Ms. Estes
2 was also by self-referral seeking counseling prior to the parenting plan ever being filed in
3 November 2012 due to the domestic violence she sustained at the hands of Mr. LaVoi.
4 Mr. LaVoi claims that he never wrote threatening emails to Ms. Estes (Transcript Vol. III Oct
5 23, 2013 pg. 44 lines 11 – 25, pg. 45 lines 1 – 24) (Evidence email 3/1/2014 placed in trial
6 court on 3/21/2014 and filed with King County Sheriff), he has continued his pattern to date
7 with his pattern of threats to withhold Lance from Ms. Estes. His actions and threats have
8 been validated by the current supervisor whom shows through her reports that Mr. LaVoi is
9 not willing to foster a relationship between mother and child. So to say that the parenting
10 plan that excludes Ms. Estes from her minor child’s life is not in the best interest of Lance.

11 Mr. LaVoi alleges that Commissioner Bonny Canada-Thurston did not validate the
12 alleged domestic violence against Ms. Estes and that there was never any legitimacy to her
13 attempts to obtain a protection order. In case number 12-2-04360-4 February 16, 2012
14 commissioner Bonny Canada-Thurston advised on record that Mr. LaVoi was “emotionally
15 blackmailing Ms. Estes into removing a protection order” and actually wanted to place the
16 protection order against Mr. LaVoi until September 2012, but due to being harassed, bullied
17 and threatened prior to the hearing for that order Ms. Estes was fearful for herself and her
18 unborn child that she removed the protection order. On November 20, 2012 for the initial
19 hearing for this parenting plan Commissioner Bonny Canada-Thurston advised Mr. LaVoi
20 counsel that was present in place of Mr. LaVoi that he was not to have any contact with Ms.
21 Estes or the minor child prior to the next hearing, which was continued until December 20,
22 2012 in front of Commissioner John Curry. The hearing on December 20, 2012 in front of
23 Commissioner Curry placed restrictions upon Mr. LaVoi due to his substance and alcohol
24 abuse along with his threats towards Ms. Estes. Mr. LaVoi had been required (but never

1 completed) to obtain a substance and alcohol assessment along with having supervised
2 visitation at his expense. Commissioner Curry reprimanded both parents at the hearing on
3 December 20, 2012 advising both of us that we need to have “respect” for each other and that
4 Mr. LaVoi was not to send any additional threatening emails or have anyone on his behalf
5 send any to Ms. Estes.

6 **2. ASSIGNMENT OF ERRORS**

7 Final Parenting Plan (cp: sub 312): Page 2 section 2.1 – does not list any restriction only
8 does not apply. Page 2 section 2.2 – inaccurately addresses an abusive use of conflict by the
9 petitioner along with inaccurately addresses that the petitioner withheld the child for a protracted
10 period without good cause.

11 The trial courts erred in stating there was restrictions placed on the petitioner/appellant in
12 section the final parenting plan (cp: sub 312). The trial court erred in inaccurately addressed the
13 petitioner/appellant whom is a victim of domestic violence at the hands of the respondent as
14 utilizing an abusive use of conflict and withholding the child for a protracted period of time. The
15 child was not withheld by the petitioner/appellant for a protracted period of time (cp: sub 16 &
16 17) Commissioner Bonny Canada-Thurston placed a no contact order against the respondent on
17 11/26/2012 in which was in place until the hearing on 12/20/12. Therefore the child was not
18 willfully withheld from the respondent. The respondent walked away from the
19 petitioner/appellant while pregnant with the child, did not give any emotional or financial
20 support to the petitioner/appellant in any way shape or form through-out the pregnancy. The trial
21 court erred within their better judgment by allowing the respondent whom is the
22 petitioner/appellants abuser to manipulate the system by playing on their emotions and
23 disregarding the petitioner/appellants evidence provided showing the on-going abuse.
24 The trial court erred in not granting any vacation (cp: 312 page 3 section 3.6) or holiday’s

1 (cp 312 page 3 section 3.7) for the petitioner/appellant with the child, as the trial court erred in
2 only allotting 8 hours of paid supervised visitation with the child (cp. 312 page 3/4 section 3.8)
3 when there was never any investigation done or completed on the petitioner/appellant regarding
4 any child abuse or negligence.

5 The trial court erred in issuing (cp: 312 Page 4 section 3.10) restrictions on the
6 petitioner/appellant by limiting her visitation time with her child to only 8 hours a week (which
7 has only occurred at 2 hours per week since January 18, 2014 to March 1, 2014 and April 5,
8 2014 to current), the petitioner/appellant tried to schedule numerous visitations between October
9 23, 2013 and January 18, 2014 with the court recommended supervised company and the
10 respondent but the petitioner/appellant was unsuccessful in her attempts in doing such. The trial
11 court erred in allowing the respondent to remove the child out of Washington State for a
12 protracted period of time without requiring the respondent to notify the petitioner/appellant.
13 Upon entering the trial court on December 19, 2013 (sub 364) is when the petitioner/appellant
14 was advised that the respondent was not in the state of Washington and would have to be
15 testifying via telephone conference, this was the first the petitioner/appellant was notified that the
16 child was out of the State of Washington and therefore would not be able to see her son for the
17 remainder of the year which violated the parenting plan immediately (cp: 312 page 3 section 3.6)
18 in where the respondent is to notify the petitioner/appellant 45 days in advance of him planning
19 on taking the child on any and all vacations, the petitioner/appellant in addition to be notified
20 (and was not) was to be allowed visitation with the child the day before the respondents vacation
21 was to begin and the day immediately following the respondents vacation. This did not happen,
22 as the respondent failed to notify the petitioner/appellant in any way shape or form of his
23 intentions to take the child for a protracted period of time for vacation from the state of
24 Washington and therefore was in immediate violation of the court orders. Therefore the trial

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1 court immediately erred in granting permission to the respondent to take the child out of
2 Washington State without properly notifying the petitioner/appellant which prevented the
3 petitioner/appellant to have consistent time with her child and due to the errors in the trial courts
4 judgment on ex-parte communication granting the respondent to immediately violate these
5 orders issued on October 31, 2013 was not only enabling the respondent to violate orders issued
6 but helped to enable to the respondent to continue his psychological and emotional abuse/trauma
7 towards both the petitioner/appellant and child.

8 The trial court erred (cp: 312 Page 4 section 3.10) by stating the petitioner/appellant
9 refused to undergo any and all psychological evaluations. The petitioner/appellant was under the
10 care of a counselor since she was pregnant with her son as the respondent was abusive
11 throughout her pregnancy. The guardian ad litem in her initial report (cp: 43) cross referenced
12 speaking with the petitioner/appellants counselor disregarded this. Since the petitioner/appellant
13 has sought out additional treatment with a new provider and has had multiple psychological
14 evaluations and has provided those evaluations along with the provider's credentials and letters
15 (attached exhibit A – was in front of the Judge on 10/21-10/23/2013 and again January 17, 2014
16 and again March 21, 2014) providing documented verification that the petitioner/appellants
17 mental health is not an issue and possess no risk in rearing her child as the respondent has
18 claimed.

19 The trial court erred in (cp: sub 257; 257A; 257B; 257C) taking custody from the
20 petitioner/appellant without the respondent properly making a motion for custody, not properly
21 informing the petitioner that custody going to be an issue on 9/26/2013, as the hearing noted on
22 the docket was for a pre-trial hearing and not custody.

23 The courts erred in taking custody of the child from the petitioner/appellant and not
24 placing the required restrictions under Washington State Laws RCW 26.09.191 Restrictions in

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1 temporary or permanent parenting plans against the respondent due his domestic violence
2 towards the petitioner/appellant. The courts erred in not properly taking the steps to prevent the
3 respondent to follow through on all his threats towards the petitioner/appellant and taking
4 custody of the child from the petitioner/appellant.

5 The trial court erred in taking custody of the child from the petitioner/appellant without
6 any investigation into being done or completed regarding any type or forms of child abuse or
7 negligence. The court erred in not taking the proper steps to ensure the safety of the child by
8 taking him from the petitioner/appellant when the petitioner has provided proof of the
9 respondents abuse towards her, along with his prior history of alcohol abuse and criminal history
10 (sub 21 and 31).

11 The court erred in not granting due process of law and violating the 14th Amendment
12 rights to the U.S. Constitution. It forbids states from denying any person "life, liberty or
13 property, without due process of law" or to "deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal
14 protection of the laws." By directly mentioning the role of the states, the 14th Amendment
15 greatly expanded the protection of civil rights to all Americans and is cited in more litigation
16 than any other amendment.

17 The trial court erred according to RCW 26.09.187(3)(a), the state legislature has dictated
18 that: "The court shall make residential provisions for each child which encourages each parent to
19 maintain a loving, stable, and nurturing relationship with the child, consistent with the child's
20 developmental level and the family's social and economic circumstances." The main concern of
21 the court (and any good parent) is that the child has a loving, safe, and stable environment. The
22 court usually hopes to achieve that by creating a parenting plan that closely mimics the child's
23 current or customary residential schedule. Having the children stay in their routine helps provide
24 a stable environment and eases them into an otherwise difficult situation. The court is also to

1 take into account additional factors for deciding child custody. The Washington state legislature
2 has enumerated seven factors that the courts are to consider when determining child custody. As
3 long as there are no limiting factors (enumerated in RCW 26.09.191), such as: physical, sexual
4 or emotional abuse towards the child, a history of domestic violence, substance abuse problems
5 that have impaired parenting functions, child abandonment, or the absence of emotional ties with
6 the child; the court has to consider the seven enumerated factors when determining child
7 custody. The seven factors are: (1) the relative strength, nature, and stability of the child's
8 relationship with each parent; (2) the agreements of the parties, provided they were entered into
9 knowingly and voluntarily; (3) each parent's past and potential for future performance of
10 parenting functions, including whether a parent has taken greater responsibility for performing
11 parenting functions relating to the daily needs of the child; (4) the emotional needs and
12 developmental level of the child; (5) the child's relationship with siblings and with other
13 significant adults, as well as the child's involvement with his or her physical surroundings,
14 school, or other significant activities; (6) the wishes of the parents and the wishes of a child who
15 is sufficiently mature to express reasoned and independent preferences as to his or her residential
16 schedule; and (7) each parent's employment schedule, and shall make accommodations
17 consistent with those schedules. The Washington courts are to give the first factor the greatest
18 weight, in which this factor was ignored increasingly throughout the trial of October 21-23,
19 2013 by the courts judgmental error. Counsel for respondent (Narrative vol. I Page 14 line 19,
20 20) stated that "the only parent that is going to allow this child to have a relationship with both
21 parents is Mr. LaVoi". The trial court erred in allowing counsel in opening and closing
22 arguments to dictate, intimidate and manipulate the system into the outcome of the proceedings
23 (Narrative vol. I page 18 lines 18-20) by stating in the opening argument that "and the court will
24 have no choice but to determine that the only parent in this case that will allow the child a

1 positive healthy relationship with both parents in Mr. LaVoi”, and in (Narrative vol. III page 135
2 lines 24 – 25 and page 136 line 1) closing statements from Tim Edwards he stated “ I want you
3 to retain jurisdiction you HAVE TO in this case as difficult as it is I could understand why you
4 wouldn’t want to I am pleading with you to take jurisdiction to try to have another”, and again
5 (Narrative Vol. III page 136 lines 5-6) Tim Edwards states “now the last this is the mother can’t
6 get a free pass here today she has not apologized in this court room truly for her conduct.”
7 The trial courts erred in allowing closing counsel (Narrative Vol. III pages 115 – 117
8 lines 10- 25 (115) lines 1-25 (116) lines 1-7) to bring forth new evidence that was withheld from
9 the petitioner/appellant and trial court, the trial court erred in allowing closing arguments to be
10 trial by ambush and intimidation as the trial court erred in allowing irrelevant material to be
11 entered as evidence in the parenting of the child. The trial court erred in allowing counsel to
12 dictate by intimidation the outcome of the proceeding set before them, due to allowing trial by
13 intimidation the outcome of this parenting plan was not made about the child nor about what
14 truly is and was in the best interest of the child (Narrative Vol. III Pages 132 – 136 lines 20-25
15 (132) lines 1-25 (133) lines 1-25 (134) lines 1-25 (135) lines 1-25 (136) lines 1-25 (137) lines 1-
16 3 (138)) the proceeding ended-up being about how much one can utilize the trial court by
17 emotionally abusing the petitioner/appellant and how far one can manipulate a system that is
18 supposed to be in place to protect the abused and not focus on how to allow the respondent
19 (abuser) to legally be allowed to manipulate counsel and the trial court into granting the authority
20 of the abuser to continue his abuse towards the victim. Closing arguments should have been
21 focused on the child in which this was clearly not the case, it was focused on how to berate and
22 victimize a victim of domestic violence even more. The court proceeding was to be about the
23 parenting of Lance and not about whom could emotionally, and mentally beat the other parent
24 down and in closing arguments made by counsel this was made very clear that the court

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1 proceeding was to emotionally and mentally abuse the petitioner/appellant and not focusing on
2 the parenting and the courts allowed counsel for the respondent to emotionally and mentally
3 abuse the petitioner/appellant.

4 The courts erred in granting the respondent astronomical attorney's fees (sub 315) along
5 with child support payments (sub 314) that directly impact the social and economic status of the
6 petitioner/appellant to a point of insolvency and is a direct reflection of the respondents
7 continued abuse towards the petitioner/appellant as this is economically/financially abusive
8 towards the petitioner/appellant to make it financially impossible for her to sustain the standard
9 of living she was accustomed to prior to ever meeting the respondent. The courts erred in not
10 only granting the respondent attorney's fees and child support payments the petitioner/appellant
11 is unable to afford the supervised visits the trial court entered an order on requiring the
12 petitioner/appellant to have these unwarranted supervised visits which causes more financial
13 hardship on the petitioner/appellant and in which makes it more difficult to see her child due to
14 the extreme financial hardship the trial courts placed against the petitioner/appellant. When
15 granting attorney's fees to a litigant under RCW 26.27.511 Costs, fees, and expenses. (1) The
16 court shall award the prevailing party, including a state, necessary and reasonable expenses
17 incurred by or on behalf of the party, including costs, communication expenses, attorneys' fees,
18 investigative fees, expenses for witnesses, travel expenses, and child care during the course of
19 the proceedings, unless the party from whom fees or expenses are sought establishes that the
20 award would be clearly inappropriate. Causing the petitioner/appellant to be placed in such a
21 financial hardship shows that it was clearly inappropriate and financially devastating on the
22 petitioner/appellant. The trial court erred by not reviewing financial documentation the
23 petitioner/appellant submitted and went on wages inaccurately imputed (order of child support
24 Page 2 lines 22-24) at a higher rate due to the inaccuracies of the statement that the

2 **4. ARGUMENT**

3 The grounds the appellant/petitioner is arguing the ruling on the final parenting plan are
4 based on the final orders for a parenting plan, support order and judgment order (sub: 312,
5 313, 314) is a direct reflection of biased opinions and blatant disregard to the psychological
6 impact along with the ramifications it would have on the petitioner/appellant and the child. The
7 petitioner/appellant and respondent were never married; the child was born to a single unwed
8 mother that's a victim of domestic violence that's been highly documented throughout this case
9 and fell on deaf ears. It appears in some of the respondents pleadings that he was under the
10 impression that he and the petitioner were married and in some form of relationship which was
11 and has never been the case. The appellant/petitioner is also arguing on the child support (sub:
12 314) that is included in this parenting plan, it distorted the truth of the petitioner being
13 voluntarily unemployed in which she was not voluntarily unemployed at any time. The amount
14 of child support was inputted inaccurately as it does not accurately reflect the petitioner/appellant
15 income, it was inputted at a higher rate of pay than she makes. The petitioner is also arguing the
16 parenting plan, child support and judgment due to all its inaccuracies, inconsistencies, along with
17 the disregard to address how the appellant/petitioner is able to regain custody of the child back
18 and not have her visits with her son supervised. The petitioner has no history of drug or alcohol
19 abuse and no criminal history and is willing to go above and beyond to do what it takes in order
20 to be the best mother possible. The respondent does have a known history of substance and
21 alcohol abuse along with abusing the petitioner.

22 **Statistically shown that: Domestic Abuse—The Generational Impact**

23 Boys who witness domestic violence are more likely to batter their female partners as adults
24 than boys raised in nonviolent homes. Of the children who witness domestic abuse, 60% of the

1 boys eventually become batterers.

2 Sixty-three percent of boys age 11-20 who commit homicide, murder the man who was abusing
3 their mother. In 50% of the time, if the wife (mother) is being physically abused, so are the
4 children. (http://www.strengthenoursisters.org/domestic_violence_statistics.html) **Statistics on:**
5 **Physical and Mental Health** Statistics Twenty-two percent to 35% of all Emergency Room
6 visits by women are related to battering. Between 25% and 45% of battered women are abused
7 during pregnancy. A battered pregnant woman is 4 times more likely to have a low-birth weight
8 baby and her chances of miscarriage are double.

9 Thirty-three percent of battered women carry a diagnosis/treatment protocol associated with
10 anxiety and depression. 26% of all women who attempt to commit suicide are victims of
11 domestic violence.

12 Sixty-four percent of hospitalized female psychiatric patients have a history of being physically
13 abused as an adult.

14 **Domestic Violence Statistics:** A woman is physically assaulted within her home every 15
15 seconds. Nearly 6 million women will be battered in any single year, and more than 25% of adult
16 women in this country are likely to be victimized during an intimate relationship.

17 Battery is the single major cause of injury to women, exceeding street rape, muggings, or auto
18 accident. Some 2,000 to 4,000 women are beaten to death annually.

19 95% of batterers are men. In heterosexual partner abuse, 95% of the time it is the woman who
20 gets hurt. Battering does occur in lesbian and gay relationships, but no reliable statistics are
21 available about its prevalence. Battering happens in dating relationships -- not just when the
22 couple is married, living together, or having sex.

23 **At least half of the children of battered women are physically or sexually abused by their**
24 **mother's assailant. 68% of children witness the assaults; more than 90 % know about the**

1 **assaults.**

2 In this country, a woman’s chances of being assaulted at home by her partner are greater than
3 those of a police officer being assaulted on the job.

4 In the United States, 3,000 women are killed each year by their husbands, lovers or boyfriends.
5 Women are in greater danger when they are trying to leave their batterers. Homicides often
6 occur after the woman has left her assailant. 70% of all violence occurs after the woman has left
7 her assailant.

8 Women perpetrate less than 15% of all homicides. Homicides committed by women are seven
9 times more likely to be in self-defense as homicides committed by men.

10 Battering cuts across racial and socio-economic lines. It occurs in middle class and upper class
11 homes, as well as in working class and poor families.

12 One out of every three girls and one out of every eight boys will be sexually abused by an adult
13 before they reach the age of 18. Nine out of ten times the perpetrator will be someone the child
14 knows.

15 One out of 7 wives is raped by her husband. At least 40% of physically battered women are also
16 sexually abused.

17 More than one million abused women seek medical help for injuries caused by battering each
18 year. Twenty percent of visits by women to emergency services are due to domestic violence.

19 **Half of all battered women will be beaten in their stomachs when they are pregnant.**

20 **At least half of the time, the perpetrator of domestic violence has an alcohol or other drug**
21 **problem. Injuries to the woman are likely to be more serious when the perpetrator is using**
22 **alcohol or other drugs. Alcohol and other drug addiction does not cause domestic violence;**
23 **the problems must be addressed separately. Stopping the assailants' drinking will not stop**
24 **their violence.**

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1 The F.B.I. estimates that only 10% of domestic assaults are reported.

2 Battering is not caused by stress, unemployment, addiction, poor impulse control or childhood
3 victimization. **Violence is a behavioral choice made by one partner to control the other.**

4 Battering is the single major cause of injury to women--more frequent than auto accidents,
5 muggings and rapes combined.

6 Studies have estimated 3 to 4 million American women are battered each year by their husbands
7 or partners. Nearly 6 million U.S. wives are physically abused by their husbands or boyfriends
8 during their marriage. Nationally, a woman is beaten every 15 seconds.

9 Sixty-six percent of American women will be beaten at least once during their marriage. 25% of
10 U.S. wives are severely beaten during the course of their marriage. 75% of women who are
11 battered are divorced or separated from their abusers at the time of the incident.

12 Domestic violence occurs among rural, urban, and suburban women of all ages, ethnic, racial,
13 religious, educational, and socio-economic groups. Approximately 95% of the victims of
14 domestic violence are women.

15 In one state study (Minnesota), 63,000 women are abused each year. In Minnesota, there were
16 18 women killed in 1989; 25 women were killed in 1990.

17 **Defining Domestic Violence**

18 **BATTERING, ABUSE, OR ASSAULT:** The use of physical force to control and maintain
19 power over an intimate partner. It involves frightening and intimidating someone repeatedly
20 over a period of time.

21 **A. PHYSICAL** (against a person): This is the most obvious -- it involves physical assault. It
22 is hitting, slugging, pushing, kicking, pulling of hair, shoving, slapping, etc.

23 **B. SEXUAL:** This involves forcing the partner to do sexual things against her/his will.
24 Genitals may be the target during sexual assault.

1 C. **PHYSICAL** (against property): This is not assault of the victim's body directly, but is the
2 destruction of property, pets and other items belonging to the family member.

3 **D. PSYCHOLOGICAL: This comes in many different forms and runs from name**
4 **calling to a campaign of terrorism equivalent to that directed towards prisoners**
5 **of war or hostages. There usually has been one physical attack which establishes**
6 **a context or framework which makes the psychological abuse more intimidating,**
7 **more credible, and more controlling. Psychological assault includes threats of**
8 **violence towards a family members, threats of having one's partner committed**
9 **or taking the children away, threats of homicide or suicide, etc.**

10 **2. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE:** Abuse in a family or household that includes woman abuse,
11 partner abuse, child abuse, incest, sibling abuse, or elder abuse.

12 **3. BATTERED WOMAN:** A victim of repeated physical, emotional (and often sexual)
13 abuse by husband, former husband, lover, boyfriend or intimate partner. The assailant is jealous,
14 controlling and uses threats, intimidation and verbal abuse, as well as physical violence, to get
15 his way. Once the battering starts, it usually gets worse and more frequent over
16 time.(http://www.strengthenoursisters.org/defining_domestic_violence.html)

17 **Child Abuse & Substance Abuse:** One-third to two-thirds of child maltreatment cases involve
18 substance use to some degree. 11

19 In one study, children whose parents abuse alcohol and other drugs were three times more
20 likely to be abused and more than four times more likely to be neglected than children from
21 non-abusing families. 11

22 As many as two-thirds of the people in treatment for drug abuse reported being abused or
23 neglected as children. 9

24 More than a third of adolescents with a report of abuse or neglect will have a substance use

1 disorder before their 18th birthday, three times as likely as those without a report of abuse or
2 neglect.12 (<http://www.childhelp-usa.com/pages/statistics#abuse-criminal>)

4 The appellant/petitioner is basing a lot of her argument on statistics found on government
5 websites regarding domestic violence and the impacts it has on the victims and their children.

6 Domestic Violence is not just physical abuse it takes on various forms (exhibit B).

7 Disability - ADA - Legal Abuse Syndrome Dr. Karin Huffer, author of Legal Abuse Syndrome

8 Legal Victim Assistance Advocates, LLC Our Mission is to ensure equal access to the judicial
9 system, by moving toward a social model over medical model for providing accommodations

10 under the Americans with Disabilities Act. They promote a fair court process with an attitude of
11 inclusion and tolerance. Their advocates enhance security, dignity and respect for every person.

12 We support the economy of the court by improving communication, acting as liaisons, and we
13 assist the court in eliminating risk of HIPAA violations or exploitation of those with special

14 needs. Their mission is affirmed by the universal declaration of human rights, 1948, the

15 convention on the elimination of discrimination against women of 1979, The ABA Resolution of

16 2002, The Americans with Disabilities Act Titles II & III, of 1990, the ADAAA of 2008, and the

19 Judges handbook 2006 Chapter 10 pg. 17 states that the comments following Section 208 of the
20 federal model UCCJEA state: Domestic violence victims shouldn't be charged with unjustifiable

21 conduct for conduct that occurred in the process of fleeing domestic violence even if the conduct
22 is technically illegal. Thus, if a parent flees with a child to escape domestic violence and in the

23 process violates a joint custody decree, the case should not be automatically dismissed under this

24 section. Inquiry must be made into whether the flight was justified under the circumstances of

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1 the case. However, an abusive parent who seizes the child and flees to another state to establish
2 jurisdiction has committed unjustifiable conduct and the new state must decline to exercise
3 jurisdiction under this section. (UCCJEA, 1997.)

5 5. CONCLUSION

6 The relief I, Kyla Estes, am asking the court for is to look at what is truly in the best interest
7 Lance LaVoi, and place him back into the sole care and custody of Kyla Estes. As, taking him
8 away from his mother for no reasoning but for lack of better judgment and placing him with Mr.
9 LaVoi to alienate and interfere with the bond between mother and son when the mother is and
10 has continued to be a victim of domestic violence. Ms. Estes continues, treatment for the abuse
11 along with being alienated from her son with a LMHC. When the courts took custody of Lance
12 LaVoi from Ms. Estes, they did not take the psychological or emotional trauma they'd induce
13 upon both Lance LaVoi and Ms. Estes. The psychological and emotional impact these past few
14 months for both mother and child have started to take an impairment upon both and if continued
15 to be allowed to withhold Lance from Ms. Estes and not place him back into the sole custody
16 and care of Ms. Estes will have future psychological impairment upon Lance LaVoi from Mr.
17 LaVoi's continued interference with the mother/son bond and him alienating Lance from Ms.
18 Estes.

19 Mr. LaVoi, has shown since October 2013 that he is unwilling to foster a bond between
20 mother and son with all the evidence placed before the trial courts showing he's unwilling to
21 allow the continued relationship between mother and son.

22 I Kyla Estes, petitioner/appellant ask the courts to look at all the evidence that was placed in
23 front of the trial court proving that I am a victim of domestic violence and have continued to be
24 victimized by Mr. LaVoi, and have the respondent attend counseling for his alcohol dependency
25 and his abuse towards me. To ensure the safety of my son, Lance and I from the respondent from

1 any additional abuse. Require the respondent to provide a DNA test to ensure he is the biological
2 father, as there is a question of paternity due to a possible rape. If the respondent is the biological
3 father after DNA testing, I'm asking the courts to limit his ability to take Lance out of the state of
4 Washington and to limit the respondents residential time to supervised until all treatment for
5 alcohol and counseling for domestic violence have been successful then have his residential time
6 phased in for unsupervised visitation, to overnight stays.

7 I, Kyla Estes, petitioner/appellate also request that my son's surname be corrected to
8 E-S-T-E-S as I was manipulated and coerced while I was medicated (able to provide
9 documentation if needed) under the care and supervision of medical doctors due to severe
10 complication of my son's delivery.

11 The best interest of Lance LaVoi is to be placed back in the sole care and custody of Kyla
12 Estes and limit Mr. LaVoi's ability to remove Lance out of the State of Washington and once
13 paternity is established by a DNA test to phase in any unsupervised residential time over the next
14 few years, as Mr. LaVoi has proven since October 3, 2013 that he will not foster a relationship
15 between Kyla Estes, the mother and Lance LaVoi, minor child and will continue to withhold
16 Lance from Ms. Estes for protracted periods of time.

17 The best interest of Lance LaVoi is to be placed back in the sole care and custody of Kyla
18 Estes and limit Mr. LaVoi's residential time until he undergoes substance abuse treatment, DV
19 assessment and psychological counseling for his abuse towards the appellant and to deny Mr.
20 LaVoi the rights to take Lance LaVoi at his leisure out of the State of Washington. I also ask the
21 courts look at the parenting plan Mr. LaVoi had filed in the trial court and see that it is unfair and
22 unjust against the mother, Kyla Estes and shows that it does not take the best interest of the
23 minor child into account. The best interest of a child is to have a loving and fostering relationship
24 with both parents but when one is as abusive as Mr. LaVoi the courts need to look at the abuse

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1 under RCW 26.09.191 and note that there should have been limitations placed upon Mr. LaVoi
2 and required him to seek court mandated treatment for his abuse. I also ask the appeal court to
3 look at the surrounding facts that Ms. Estes was denied due process law under her constitutional
4 rights and has continued to be denied the right to Lance without any evidence of abuse or
5 negligence and has been denied the utmost fundamental right of parenting. Forty-eight years
6 after Pierce, the U.S. Supreme Court once again upheld Pierce as “the charter of the rights of
7 parents to direct the upbringing of their children.” 16 In agreement with Pierce, Chief Justice
8 Burger stated in the opinion of Wisconsin v. Yoder in 1972:

9 This case involves the fundamental interest of parents, as contrasted with that of the state, to
10 guide the religious future and education of their children. The history and culture of Western
11 civilization reflect a strong tradition of parental concern for the nurture and upbringing of their
12 children. This primary role of the parents in the upbringing of their children is now established
13 beyond debate as an enduring tradition and due to not being granted the due process of law under
14 the US Constitution fourteenth amendment the bond between Lance and I are being strained
15 without the due process of law. In Lassiter [Lassiter v. Department of Social Services, 452 US
16 18, 37 (1981)], it was “not disputed that state intervention to terminate the relationship between a
17 parent and a child must be accomplished by procedures meeting the requisites of the Due Process
18 Clause”. . . The absence of dispute reflected this Court’s historical recognition that freedom of
19 personal choice in matters of family life is a fundamental liberty interest protected by the 14th
20 Amendment ... Pierce v. Society of Sisters ... Meyer v. Nebraska.

21 The fundamental liberty interest of natural parents in the care, custody, and management of their
22 child does not evaporate simply because they have not been model parents or have lost
23 temporary custody of their child to the state ... When the state moves to destroy weakened
24 familial bonds, it must provide the parents with fundamentally fair procedures.
