Petitioner Walker seeks review of the Court of Appeals' decision in <u>State v. Walker</u>, No. 84531-4-I, __ Wn. App. 2d __, 2024 WL 1717968 (Apr. 22, 2024), in which the court affirmed the trial court's grant of Walker's motion to vacate his conviction for possession of a controlled substance in the wake of <u>State v. Blake</u>, 197 Wn.2d 170, 481 P.3d 521 (2021). The State asks this Court to deny the petition for review. Walker does not discuss any of the criteria for review set out in RAP 13.4(b), let alone establish that any are satisfied in this case. Moreover, the reasoning and authority set out in the Court of Appeals' opinion makes clear that Walker's appeal is meritless and that the criteria for review are not met here.

But in addition to the reasoning set forth in the Court of Appeals' opinion, there are several grounds upon which to affirm the trial court that were raised by the State and not addressed by the Court of Appeals. These arguments provide even more reasons why the petition for review should be denied. Specifically, the Court of Appeals did not address the State's arguments that (1) Walker's appeal should be dismissed because Walker is not an aggrieved party within the meaning of RAP 3.1¹ (Br. of Respondent at 8-10); (2) Walker's claim is

¹ The State initially filed a motion to dismiss the appeal on this basis before Walker filed his opening brief. A commissioner of the Court of Appeals denied the motion without prejudice and stated that the State could renew the motion in the Brief of Respondent. barred by the doctrine of invited error (Br. of Respondent at 10-11); (3) Walker fails to establish that the right to counsel and right to be present are implicated when the trial court grants an agreed CrR 7.8 motion to vacate a constitutionally-invalid conviction (Br. of Respondent at 11-17); and (4) any error was harmless because, even if counsel had been appointed and had brought a motion to withdraw Walker's guilty pleas on other offenses before the <u>Blake</u>-affected conviction was vacated, the motion would have been an untimely collateral attack barred by RCW 10.73.090 (Br. of Respondent at 17-20). If this Court grants the petition for review, the State asks that the Court also review these alternative bases to affirm.

For the foregoing reasons, the petition for review should be denied.
