I. <u>IDENTITY OF RESPONDING PARTY</u>

The Respondent, State of Washington, requests the relief designated in part II.

II. STATEMENT OF RELIEF SOUGHT

The State requests that the Court deny Owen Gale Ray's motion to strike unspecified portions of the respondent's answer

that Ray characterizes as "misstate[ments of] several important facts," "an argument not raised below," and "any argument that uses these facts for support." Motion to Strike at 1.

III. FACTS RELEVANT TO MOTION

Owen Gale Ray was convicted of felony harassment, second degree assault, and reckless endangerment arising from a post-Christmas incident in which he threatened to kill his wife and assaulted her with a firearm in the presence of two young children. RP 1530-31. Ray appealed his convictions and his sentence.

Ray, for the first time on appeal, claimed that convictions for both felony harassment and second degree assault violated double jeopardy. Appellant's Opening Brief at 69-75. The State's response to this argument, which was one of five and which was necessarily truncated by the appellate court's denial of Ray's motion for overlength brief, identified the four-part test for cumulative punishment double jeopardy claims. *See* Brief of Respondent at 56. The State's argument focused on the

"independent purposes" prong as that was dispositive. *Id.* at 56-60. No where in the State's brief was there a concession that the two convictions were supported by the same act of pointing the firearm at K.R.

To the contrary, the statement of the case in the State's brief of respondent¹ identified four separate instances where Ray threatened K.R. with the weapon. *See* Brief of Respondent at 8 (on the staircase), 10 (in the children's room), 10 (after breaking down the door and reentering the bedroom), and 11 (as K.R. sought to shepherd her younger children to safety).

The court of appeals affirmed Ray's sentence in an opinion that rejected his double jeopardy claim on the grounds that harassment and assault serve independent purposes. *State v. Ray*, No. 86163-8-I, 2024 WL 4025999 at *13 (Wash. App. Sep. 3, 2024) (unpublished). Ray filed a timely petition for review that

raised only two issues. One of which was his cumulative punishment double jeopardy claim.

The State's response, consistent with its brief of respondent, identified four separate and distinct incidents where Ray pointed the gun at K.R. *See* Answer at 4-6. The answer explained that further review of the court of appeals' rejection of Ray's double jeopardy argument was unnecessary because Ray failed two of the four prongs of the cumulative punishment test and the court's unpublished opinion in this case did not conflict with any published opinions. *See* Answer at 21-27.

Eight days after the State filed its answer to Ray's petition for review, Ray filed a "Motion to Strike Respondent's Answer Improperly Characterizing Facts." The relief requested is somewhat ambiguous in that Ray both moves to strike the State's answer in its entirety and/or for this Court to disregard what Ray considers to be "misstate[ments of] several important facts" and the argument predicated on these facts. Motion to Strike at 1.

The State files this timely response to Ray's motion.

IV. GROUNDS FOR RELIEF AND ARGUMENT

Ray requests that this Court strike the State's answer to his petition for review for alleged violations of RAP 10.3(a)(5) and (6), RPC 3.1, and RPC 3.3(a)(1). Motion to Strike at 1-2. Ray's motion must be denied as the State has not violated any of these provisions and the motion is an effort to circumvent RAP 13.4(d)'s prohibition on replies to answers to petitions for review that do not raise a new issue for review.

Ray's real complaint regarding the State's answer to his petition for review is he does not like the State's summary of the facts which conflicts with the version he reconstructed in his mind from the 911 recordings. *See* RP 571 ("Hard to reconstruct this exactly because [Ray's] memory is awfully impaired of this"); RP 1375 (Ray only remembers shards and bits and pieces of the incident and he only "know[s] what was recorded on the 9-1-1 recording"). He claims that "a reading of the record in fact makes it difficult to determine how many times the gun may have been raised and lowered during the course of the evening."

Motion to Strike at 3. Finally, Ray objects to the State indicating that prong one of the double jeopardy test has not been satisfied because it distracts from his prong 4 argument. *See* Motion to Strike at 7 ("This argument also does not respond to Mr. Ray's petition, which seeks resolution of a split between the divisions regarding whether second degree assault and felony harassment stemming from the same act constitute double jeopardy."). Ray's motion to strike should be rejected as an unauthorized reply to the State's answer. *See* RAP 13.4(d) (reply only authorized when the answer raises a new issue for review).

Ray's allegation of unethical conduct by undersigned counsel, moreover, is not a basis for striking an answer. "[T]he remedy for a claimed violation of the RPC is a request for discipline by the bar association." *State v. Lord*, 117 W.2d 829, 887, 822 P.2d 177 (1991), *abrogated on other grounds by State v. Schierman*, 192 Wn.2d 577, 438 P.3d 1063 (2018). In the context of a criminal appeal, Ray's claim that the State's answer is "improper," Motion to Strike at 7, is determined under the identified court rules. *Id.* Ray's motion to strike must be rejected

because the State's answer complies with both RAP 10.3(a)(5) and (6).

The State's answer fully complies with RAP 10.3(a)(5) and (6). RAP 10.3(a)(5) requires every factual assertion in the statement of the case be supported by a reference to the record. The State complied with this requirement as each of the four incidents of Ray's pointing a firearm at K.R. is supported by a citation to the record:

When K.R. distanced herself from Ray by seeking refuge on the third floor of the house where the children slept, Ray obtained a handgun and then climbed the stairs looking for her. RP 486, 488-89. After Ray ignored K.R.'s plea to put the gun away, K.R. called 9-1-1. RP 491. Ray responded by pointing the gun at K.R. and telling her to hang up. **RP** 493.

The 9-1-1 system recorded much of the chaos that ensued, including K.R. begging for help because Ray had a gun and was threatening her, was "going to kill us," and "he's going to kill my kids." *Ex. 33 and 35*. The 9-1-1 recording also contains both statements of possible self-harm from Ray and the repeated invectives he directed at Kristin. *Id.* Finally, the 9-1-1 call includes children crying out "Dad, Please don't hurt us," "I don't want to die," and "please don't hurt her." Ex. 35. The 9-1-1

recording did not, however, clearly capture everything that was said during the incident. RP 684, 833, 963; Exs. 33, 35 (screaming and inaudible sounds).

K.R.'s attempt to get away from Ray resulted in her stumbling and falling to the floor of her middle child's room. RP 493. Ray followed, firearm in hand, stood over her and kicked and stomped her in the head, face, and chest. RP 493, 510, 640-41, 947, 960. Following the assault, Ray left the bedroom only to return and point the gun at K.R. a second time. *RP 493, 839, 841, 955*. When Ray broke down the door and returned to the room a third time, he pointed the gun at the children on the bed. *RP 497, 843, 955*. K.R. placed herself between the gun and her children. *RP 497, 844*. Ray kept the gun pointed at K.R., and after turning off the lights pointed the gun again at K.R. and the children. *RP 497-98, 944, 946*.

When Ray left the bedroom to yell at the police officers who surrounded the home, K.R. and the children made their escape. **RP** 499. As K.R. fled, Ray pointed the gun at K.R. a fourth time but did not shoot. **Id**.

Answer at 4-6 (footnotes omitted and emphasis added).

Ray claims that the State's citations do not support its summary. Motion to Strike at 6. He is wrong. The cited portions of the verbatim report of proceedings fully support that Ray

pointed the firearm at K.R. on four separate occasions during the incident and the 911 recordings coupled with K.R.'s testimony supports verbal threats of death, albeit not stated as "I'm going to kill you." *See* Excerpt of Transcripts at appendix pages 26-56.

RAP 10.3(a)(5) requires that the arguments in the brief be supported with citations to legal authority and references to the record. The portion of the State's answer that addresses Ray's double jeopardy claim contains citations to one court rule, two constitutional provisions, nine statutes, and seven cases. Answer at 21-27. And the facts referenced in this section of the answer are those contained in the statement of the case which are supported by the record.

V. CONCLUSION

The State respectfully requests that this Court deny Ray's motion to strike.

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II. RESTATEMENT OF THE ISSUES

- A. Did the trial court abuse its discretion by admitting the video of the children's nontestimonial excited utterances that were captured by a camera mounted in the patrol car?
- B. Did Ray, who elected not to call Dr. Chang to the stand, waive any challenge to the "functional exclusion" of this witness?
- C. Did Ray fail to establish prosecutorial error where the prosecutor's statements during closing argument and rebuttal were neither improper nor prejudicial?
- D. Did the legislature authorize separate punishments for convictions of second-degree assault and felony harassment where the two crimes deal with different harms, and are found in different chapters of the Revised Code of Washington?
- E. Did the trial court abuse its discretion by admitting first person testimony of a prior assault to show the reasonableness of that person's fear during the instant incident?

III. STATEMENT OF THE CASE

Owen Ray and Kristin Ray¹ married in 1997. RP 466. The marriage was good prior to 2017, with Kristin moving frequently in support of Ray's Army career and managing the household

during Ray's frequent deployments. RP 466-71, 647-50, 941, 1311, 1364. The marriage began to deteriorate around 2017, when Kristin, who, with the support of Ray had returned to school to get a master's degree and principal certification, decided to return to work full time. RP 467, 1336. Ray was unhappy with Kristin's decision to return to work as he had decided to accept a new position at Joint Base Lewis McChord (JBLM), rather than retiring. RP 468, 1338. Ray wanted Kristin to delay reentering the work force so she would be available to perform the social and volunteer activities expected of a colonel's wife and perform all household duties. RP 468-70, 1363-64. Ray's brother, Jacob "Jake" Ray, believed that some of the marital problems were the result of Kristin becoming more assertive. RP 1194, 1996.

Ray's positions at JBLM were stressful, requiring long hours. RP 651, 1115, 1126, 1245-46, 1337, 1345. His appointment as chief of staff in June of 2020 was a culmination of a career during which Ray progressively assumed command

over larger and larger groups of soldiers. RP 1073, 1085, 1112-14, 1231-34, 1250, 1285, 1328, 1336, 1344, 1362. Although Ray's subordinates were concerned in later years that his alcohol consumption needed to be watched, Ray's performance of his duties was always exemplary, resulting in a promotion in June 2020 to JBLM Chief of Staff. RP 731, 1085-88, 1094-97, 1099, 1118-20, 1254. Those who worked closest with Ray described his as an excellent commander, strong-willed, self-centered, and with a high ego. RP 1102-03.

While Ray's increased alcohol consumption did not impact his work life, it did impact his home life. As Ray turned to hard alcohol, he would get angry and yell and cuss and call Kristin a bitch. RP 471-72. As the drinking increased in frequency, Kristin engaged in strategies to shield her children from Ray's outbursts. RP 473. These strategies were not always effective. RP 474.

In June 2020, Ray was yelling and cussing while facing Kristin in the front entry, when he grabbed her and pushed her

into the wall by the front door. RP 474. Kristin quickly got away and put a table between them, but not before her head hit the wall. *Id.* Kristin never reported this incident to police. RP 475.

On December 26, 2020, Ray, who usually spent fifteen hours in the office on workdays and some weekends, took his two oldest children skiing. RP 476, 1115, 1126, 1245, 1345. The trip did not begin auspiciously as Ray, felt that Kristin was undermining his authority with the children and that she did not trust him to take the children skiing. RP 466, 1347.² The trip did not go well due to bad weather, COVID shutdowns, and one of the children falling and injuring herself. RP 476, 1347.

The disappointing skiing trip led to a stressful evening, with Ray drinking a significant amount of alcohol. RP 480, 734, 746. As Ray drank, he got louder and became increasingly testy. *Id.* Ray became angry when Kristin agreed to take her oldest to

the base the next morning after Ray had stated he would. RP 480-82. Ray continued the argument via text after Kristin went upstairs to shower and put the younger children to bed. RP 484, 637-38, 657; Ex. 82.

When Kristin exited the shower on the second floor, she could hear Ray downstairs yelling at the TV. RP 484. Kristin went downstairs to tend to the family dog, Moose, who was recovering from surgery. *Id.* After Kristin got Moose settled, she closed the double doors that separated the living room from the stairwell so that Ray's unintelligible yelling would not carry up to the children. *Id.*; RP 658. Kristin turned on her phone's recording feature at this point because Ray was being very loud and yelling. RP 658. The recording captured angry words and "reciprocal conversation." RP 748; Ex. 102.

Ray confronted Kristin about closing the doors. RP 485, 1349. Despite Kristin asking Ray to be quiet so as not to wake the children, Ray got in Kristin's face and started cussing at her

and calling her names. RP 485. Ray did, however, walk away when Kristin returned to the second floor. *Id*.

From the second floor, Kristin heard Ray saying things like "You want to do this?" "Lets do this." RP 486. Believing that Ray was preparing to come upstairs to pick a fight, Kristin retreated to the third floor in the hope that Ray would refrain from fighting around the children. *Id*.

From the third-floor landing, Kristin observed Ray putting on shoes, she heard him go into the garage, and then watched Ray ascend to the second floor to conduct a room-by-room search. RP 488. As Ray slammed doors aggressively, Kristin dialed 9-1-1 on her phone but did not hit send. RP 489. Kristin did not immediately hit send because she hoped Ray would remain on the second floor. *Id*.

Contrary to her hopes, Ray quickly ascended the stairs to the third floor. RP 490. As he neared, Kristin saw that he was holding a handgun down at his side by his leg. *Id.* Ray then went into their oldest child's room, inquired about her skiing injury,

said good night, and closed the door to the oldest child's room.

Id. Kristin ended her recording at this time. RP 682.

Ray then turned on Kristin and advanced on her while yelling. RP 491. Kristin told Ray to put the gun away or she would call 9-1-1. *Id.* Ray responded, "Go ahead. Call 9-1-1. I don't care." RP 492. But once Kristin gave her name to the 9-1-1 operator, Ray who had started going downstairs, came back and pointed the gun at Kristin and told her to hang up. RP 493.

The 9-1-1 system recorded much of the chaos that ensued, including Kristin begging for help because Ray had a gun and was threatening her, was "going to kill us," and "he's going to kill my kids." Ex. 34 and 35. The 9-1-1 recording also contains both statements of possible self-harm from Ray and the repeated invectives he directed at Kristin. *Id.* Finally, the 9-1-1 call includes children crying out "Dad, Please don't hurt us," and "I

don't want to die." Ex. 35. The 9-1-1 recording did not, however, clearly capture everything that was said during the incident. RP 684, 833, 963; Exs. 34-35 (screaming and inaudible sounds).⁴ And Kristin's intent in calling 9-1-1 was to obtain help, not to create a detailed account of everything that was occurring. RP 954.

Kristin did not hang up, instead retreating into her middle daughter's room. RP 493. While doing so, she stumbled and ended up on the floor. *Id.* Kristin, who did not want the children to see her being shot, crammed herself into a narrow space between the end of M.R.'s bed and the wall. RP 509-10, 640, 947; Ex. 83. While so constrained, Ray stood over her with the firearm and kicked and stomped her in the head, face, and chest. RP 493, 510, 640-41, 947, 960.

Ray then left the children's room before returning and pointing the gun at Kristin a second time. RP 493, 839, 841, 955. When Ray left the room a second time, Kristin closed the door, locked it, and pulled a bookcase in front of the door. RP 494. Ray, finding the door locked, began yelling and kicked at the door until it broke open sending Kristin and the bookcase to the floor. RP 497, 506-08; Ex. 16-18.

Ray, upon reentering the room a third time, pointed the gun at the children on the bed. RP 497, 843, 955. Kristin jumping up from the floor placed herself between the gun and the children. RP 497, 844. Ray kept the gun pointed at Kristin and after he tripped over the bookcase, turned the lights off and pointed the gun again at Kristin and the children. RP 497-98, 944, 946.

When Ray left the bedroom to yell at the police officers, Kristin grabbed the children and started for the door. RP 498. When Ray returned and blocked it with his body, Kristin yelled at him to "Let them go. Be a Dad." RP 499. Eventually Ray

stepped back, and Kristin shoved the children out the door. *Id*.

Ray raised the gun at Kristin one more time but did not shoot. *Id*. Kristin yelled for her older daughter to leave, as she and the younger children ran down the stairs and out of the house.

RP 500.

Meanwhile, police officers from multiple jurisdictions converged on the Ray home, with the first units arriving shortly after midnight. RP 173, 175, 281, 307, 352. The officers established containment and arranged for a negotiator in the hopes of ending the incident without bloodshed. RP 175-76, 283, 334-35, 370-71. They did not immediately enter the house because of reports of possible guns in the house and the high risk of the incident escalating. RP 177, 283, 308. And at least one officer heard the distinct sound of a firearm being racked while Kristin and the children were still inside the home. RP 309.

Approximately 18 minutes after the first officers arrived at the Ray home, Kristin followed the younger children out of the home. RP 230-31, 499; Ex. 42. The running trio were directed

toward a waiting police car. RP 500, 1024; Ex. 42. This police car was equipped with video and audio recording devices. RP 1019. The devices had been turned on prior to Kristin and her children entering the vehicle. RP 1021.

Once Kristin's oldest daughter also made her escape from the house and was seated in the patrol car, the vehicle was driven a few blocks away to where a make-shift command center was being set up. RP 500-01, 1024; Ex. 42. Immediately upon arrival at the command post, Kristin was questioned regarding Ray's access to weapons in the home, phone numbers at which Ray may be reached, and other information necessary to evaluate the threat Ray posed to the officers surrounding the home. RP 235, 501, 1025-26.

The preliminary questioning of Kristin began while she was in the back of the patrol car prior to her being told that a recording was being made. Ex. 40(b). The preliminary questioning continued outside the patrol car and was captured on Officer Campbell's body worn camera and some on the patrol

car's video and audio system. RP 183; Ex.44. Kristin, clad in a bathrobe, was visibly distraught during the interviews. RP 179-80; Exs. 44 and 40(b). Kristin explained that Ray, who had been drinking and threatening, kicked her in the head, chest and face, had pointed a gun at her, had threatened to shoot himself in front of the children, threatened to shoot her, and had broken down the door to the children's room. Ex. 44.

While Kristin was being questioned outside the patrol car, the three children remained seated in the patrol car. RP 180; Ex. 40(b). The patrol car's video and audio system captured an unscripted discussion of the incident between the three children. RP 1021, 1026; Ex. 40(b). The children expressed the fear they felt, which had not been totally alleviated by their distance from the house. Ex. 40(b) at 00:47:13-1:01:10. During their emotional discussion of the incident, the youngest child, C.R., stated that he had been so "terrified" that Ray would shoot his mother that he wetted himself during the incident. The middle child, M.R., described her mother being backed into a corner and kicked, Ray

pointing the gun at both Kristin and the children, and her fear that Ray was going to shoot Kristin. *Id.* During these disclosures, the oldest child, L.R., attempted to relieve the younger children's fears by discussing the patrol cars safety equipment, that their mother was with police officers and thereby safe now, and telling them it would be okay. *Id.*

Approximately 16 minutes after the patrol car had come to a stop and while officers were obtaining preliminary information from Kristin necessary for threat assessment and successful negotiation, the officer whose patrol car the children were seated in, advised the children that they were being recorded. *Compare* Ex. 44 at 48:32 *with* Ex. 44 at 1:05:06.

At the command center, medical assistance was called for Kristin, who had obvious facial injuries. RP 180-83, 419, 641-43, 986, 1028; Ex. 23-29. Kristin, wishing to remain with her children, refused, despite hurting all over, to go to the hospital for treatment. RP 260, 501-02, 639, 643. The ice pack Kristin accepted from the EMT's did not, however, alleviate the impact

of Ray repeatedly kicking her. RP 501. Kristin subsequently obtained treatment for pain in her back, neck, ribs and shoulder, and headaches, disturbed sleep and vision problems. RP 618-634, 643-646, 930, 940.

Using the phone number obtained from Kristin, Sergeant Catlett, a trained negotiator, attempted to reach Ray by phone. RP 368, 375. Following three unsuccessful calls and the PA system to urge Ray to call him back, Catlett first spoke to Ray at 12:49 a.m. RP 377. This first call lasted between 5 and 10 minutes and was followed by up to nine more conversations. RP 378.

During the first call, Ray very calmly told Sergeant Catlett that he had been drinking and that Kristin should not have called the police. RP 379. Ray further stated that he was going to kill every single officer that came into his house: repeating the phrases "I will fucking kill every single one of you; it will be a fucking blood bath," multiple times. RP 379. Catlett believed Ray's threats to kill. RP 397-98.

Ray instructed Sergeant Catlett to make some phone calls to learn about Ray's background. RP 380. The information obtained both from Ray and others included that Ray was in Special Forces for several years, that he had killed a lot of people, and that Ray had no problem killing the police officers if they went into the house. *Id.* Ray's significant combat experience and the tactical advantage he had in the tall house was of great concern to Catlett and the other officers. RP 289, 348, 381. These concerns were increased, rather than allayed, when Ray retreated into the house, turned off the lights, and racked a shotgun. RP 289-90, 293, 345, 347-49, *see also* RP 315-16.

Ray was observed carrying what was believed to be the buttstock of a rifle while he paced inside the home after his family had exited. RP 300, 312. He was also observed walking around the house, looking out windows, including windows from rooms in which firearms were later found. RP 318, 341-42. These observations were made while announcements were directed over a PA system telling Ray that "This is Lakewood"

Police Department, DuPont Police Department; Mr. Ray, come outside and surrender." RP 312-13, *see also* RP 347.

During the ensuing hours long standoff, Ray appeared on the third-floor balcony holding a firearm. RP 341-344. No officer saw Ray point the firearm at them, but Ray was observed placing the firearm against his temple on several occasions. RP 287, 291-92, 302, 341-44, 345-47, 355, 364, 399. Throughout the standoff, Ray indicated that Kristin was the person to blame for the situation. RP 287 (Ray yelled something to the effect of "Kristin, look what you did."); RP 382-83 (Ray telling negotiator that Kristin should not have called the police and that she involved the police to obtain leverage in a divorce); RP 639 (text message sent by Ray to Kristin at 1:57 a.m. stating, "Thanks for this. Best wife ever.").

Ray slowly calmed down, with fewer threats directed at law enforcement and more statements about the impact the incident would have on Ray's life and career. RP 382. Over time, Ray would alternate between conditional threats to kill law

enforcement if they were to enter his home, threats to kill himself, and a stated intention to not hurt anybody. RP 384-87, 393-94. Eventually, Ray agreed to come out of the residence. RP 387. Ray exited the home with his hands up and was taken into custody without incident at 2:22 a.m. RP 187, 388.

Following Ray's surrender, a sweep was performed of the house to make sure no other person remained who was either hurt or who could cause harm to anybody else. RP 188. During the sweep and follow up searches, handguns, a shotgun, magazines, and rounds were collected from various locations in the home. RP 188-90, 197-210, 318, 991-995; Exs. 1-22, 46, 47, 48, 50.

A few days after his arrest, Ray spoke by phone with his brother Jake, his mother, and his father. RP 1010. During these conversations, Ray expressed remorse, and stated that the incident was all his fault and he "just lost it" when 9-1-1 was called. Exs. 106-109. While Ray stated that he never threatened the kids, he did not make the same assertion as to Kristin. *Id*.

Ray was charged with seven offenses arising from the events on December 27th. *See* CP 453. Ray asserted a diminished capacity defense to all but one count. CP 975.⁵ Ray contended that a combination of his untreated Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), multiple head injuries sustained in the army, and his alcohol consumption rendered him unable to act intentionally or knowingly. CP 984-988.

Dr. Mark Koenen, an expert retained by Ray, reported that he diagnosed Ray as having PTSD, traumatic brain injury (TBI), depressive disorder and alcohol use disorder and that the VA had found Ray disabled based, in part, due to PTSD and TBI. RP 542-44, 559. Dr. Koenen opined that to a reasonable medical certainty that the symptomology and existence of Ray's various diagnoses affected Ray's ability to act intentionally or knowingly during portions of the early morning of December 27, 2020. RP 565-66.

⁵ Ray conceded his guilt as to reckless endangerment during his closing argument. RP 1491.

Dr. Koenen's opinion that Ray was "emotionally dysregulated," and that rage was accompanied by "some symptoms of disassociation", RP 566, was based largely on Ray's self-report of the incident and an idiosyncratic definition that is not found in DSM-5 or DSM 5-R or relied on by psychologists. RP 546, 568-570, 571, 575, 584, 604-05, 608, 751-53. Dr. Koenen conceded that Ray was oriented as to place, was not experiencing hallucinations, a flashback or psychosis, knew that he was speaking with Kristin and the children, and knew that the police had arrived. RP 593-98. Dr. Koenen also conceded that Ray's work performance was not affected by the PTSD and that Ray knew he had a handgun when he went upstairs. RP 589-90, 606. Accord RP 1104-05, 1120, 1126, 1254, 1265, 1269.

Ray was also evaluated by Dr. Judd. RP 709-15. Dr. Judd, who was retained by the State, reviewed thousands of pages of records related to the incident, including transcripts of the 9-1-1 calls, the jail phone calls, Kristin's recordings from the 26th and

27th, and defense interviews of the three children. RP 706-07. Dr. Judd ruled out PTSD as a substantive contributor to the incident, largely because there was no indication in the months leading up to the incident that Ray's self-reported PTSD symptoms⁶ interfered with his social, occupational, or other important areas of functioning. RP 763-64. *See also* RP 786, 807, 818. Dr. Judd disagreed with the other experts as to the onset of Ray's PTSD or that PTSD "caused" the events. Dr. Judd's disagreement largely arises from Ray's statements that "he snapped" when 9-1-1 was called as PTSD is not a sudden emergency condition. RP 761, 820-21.⁷

⁶Kristin reported that Ray did not complain of PTSD symptoms or display symptoms at home prior to the December 26, 2020, incident. RP 474, 651-52, 780, 957.

⁷ Dr. Judd, as do other experts in North America, relied upon the objective criteria contained in the DSM-5 to diagnose PTSD. *See* RP 722-27, 818. Ray's treatment providers did not. *See* RP 544-45 (diagnosed with "complex PTSD" which is "not something that's in the DSM-4 or -5"), 805.

Dr. Judd did not agree that Ray was experiencing disassociation during the incident or that Ray could not formulate intent or knowledge. RP 762. Dr. Judd explained that "disassociation" as defined by the DSM requires some impairment in contact with reality and that dissociative features cannot be applied to someone who is acutely intoxicated. RP 714, 754, 764-65. The 9-1-1 recording, the text messages Ray sent to Kristin during the incident, and Ray's statements to the responding police officers all established that Ray knew who he Ray engaged in reciprocal was dealing with. RP 754. interactions and conversations with Kristin, and there is no indication during the 9-1-1 call or in his contacts with Sergeant Catlett that Ray was unaware of his surrounding, who he was, who he was speaking with, or who the people around him were. RP 762, see also RP 754-762.

Dr. Judd further opined that there was no evidence that Ray was unable to formulate the intent necessary for the charged crimes. RP 766. Dr. Judd reached the same conclusion as to

Ray's ability to act knowingly. RP 767. Ray engaged in goal-oriented behavior during the incident and Ray had mixed motives during the incident. RP 766, 768.

Ray, who was able to recall in detail the military experiences that contributed to his PTSD, claimed an inability to recall the events of December 26th or 27th. RP 763, 1351. While Ray claimed that he never pointed a gun at Kristin or the children, he based his denial on the absence from the 9-1-1 recording of a statement from Kristin that he was pointing a gun at her. RP 1375. Ray did recall that the incident occurred on the third floor of the house in a child's bedroom, that police responded and surrounded the house, and that he was armed. RP 1351-52, 1355. Finally, Ray conceded that he was angry at Kristin. RP 1366, 1370, 1373.

Ray's matter proceeded to jury trial.⁸ The court dismissed count 3, the assault predicated on Ray kicking Kristin, after the

⁸ Additional facts related to the denial or admission of evidence will appear in the argument section for those claims.

State rested due to insufficient evidence of substantial bodily harm. RP 1043. The jury returned verdicts on all remaining counts, finding Ray guilty of both second-degree assault with a deadly weapon and harassment with respect to Kristin, while acquitting Ray of the harassment counts related to the police negotiator. RP 1529-32. The jury also found Ray guilty of reckless endangerment. RP 1531. The jury further found that both Kristin and Ray had an intimate relationship, that Ray and the victims of the reckless endangerment were family and household members, that the offenses occurred in the presence of the couple's children. RP 1529-32.

Ray filed a timely notice of appeal. CP 559. He is prosecuting this appeal pursuant to an order of indigency. CP 560. Ray, however, is not indigent. *See* RAP 15.2(h) motion (Aug. 10, 2023).

And he -- at one point, he backed up to the door, and he turned the lights off on us, and then he raised the gun at us again.

A He was standing in the doorway, and the loft lights were all on, so he was backlit. So we were sitting in the dark, except the door was open, and the light was coming in, and he was pointing the gun at us. Like he didn't want to see what would happen when -- I don't know why else he would have turned off the lights on us.

That's what 13 14 you say to him a couple of times. Do you remember saying that? 15 Α I do. 16 And that's because you believed that if you can 17 convey to him to be a dad --18 He wouldn't shoot the kids. Α 19 Let me finish my question. That he would stop with Q 20 the gun directed towards himself, right? 21 Α No. At that point, he had walked over by the kids, 22 and at one point, he pointed the gun at the kids, and I 23 remember saying that to get him to quit. 24 Well, nowhere in the transcripts do you ever say, 25 "Don't shoot the kids," do you?

1	A No. I was too busy jumping in front of the gun.
2	Q At no point in the transcripts do you say, "Don't
3	point the gun at me and the kids," do you?
4	A Sorry. I forgot to say that while I was getting
5	kicked in the face. You're right. I might not have said that.
6	Q Well, there are times you just described jumping
7	in front of the kids and describing Owen Ray pointing the gun
8	at you; you don't document that by any statement during the
9	course in your conversation with 9-1-1, do you?
10	A I don't know. I believe I'm documenting I'm
11	asking for help. I document asking them to "come faster." I
12	document, "I can't stop him."
13	MR. AUSSERER: I'm sorry, Your Honor. I'm
14	going to ask that she responds to the question.
15	THE COURT: Ask your next question, Counsel.
16	MR. AUSSERER: Thank you.
17	BY MR. AUSSERER:
18	Q You just described that he was pointing the gun at
19	your kids during this exchange that we talked about; is that
20	right?
21	A He pointed the gun at them twice. I'm not sure
22	exactly during what part, in this transcript, it happened.
23	Q Okay. Well, immediately after the portion I just
24	asked you about on page 2 of Exhibit 36, you're on 9-1-1, and
25	the transcripts document that you are telling the kids "It's

1	okay to go see Dad," right?
2	A No. That's a misprint. I never said that.
3	Q You never said, "It's okay to go see Dad," on 9-1-1?
4	A No.
5	Q Because you wouldn't have said that if he's actually
6	pointing the gun at them, would you?
7	A I didn't say that, though. I believe that line is in
8	between "He's going to kill us" and "Help us."
9	MR. AUSSERER: Your Honor, again, I'm going to
10	object
11	THE COURT: Okay. Just a moment.
12	I'm going to strike the last response.
13	Wait for the next question, please.
14	The jury will disregard the last response of the
15	witness.
16	Ask your next question.

Q You specifically testified during the course of this trial that Owen Ray turned off the lights, positioned himself so the lighting behind him made him visible to you, and then he pointed the gun directly at you and the kids. Do you remember testifying to that?

A Yes. That's what happened.

Q And you never said that sequence of events to any of the individuals that you were interviewed by previously, did you?

A I believe I did. But I don't remember if I said that exact sentence, no. But I believe I did.

Q Then you testified that you tried to get out of the room with the kids and that Owen Ray physically restrained you and pushed you guys back into the bedroom. Do you remember saying that last week?

A No. I said we walked to the door. He came at the door, walked towards us, and stood in the doorway. He came at us with the gun, and we backed up. He blocked the doorway. He didn't hold on to me and restrain me. I never said that.

Q And you've never said that to any of the individuals that interviewed you in the days after this incident, did you?

A What? That he walked towards us as we tried to exit? Yes, I did say that.

Q All right. So what you just described, your testimony is you said that to each of the people that have

1 interviewed you leading you up to -- following the incident? 2 I cannot say that I said that to each of the 3 individuals that you named. I'm not sure I said that to each 4 individual that you named. I'm not sure that after he kicked 5 me in the head, I had the sense to say that exact sentence to 6 each individual that interviewed me. 7 Q Well, the people that interviewed you, interviewed 8 you in days and even weeks after the incident, right? 9 wasn't just that morning, right? 10 I'm sure I said it to some of them, yes. 11 One of the things that you said is that there was a 12 physical push and that you and the kids fell backwards towards 13 the bed -- do you remember saying that last week? -- as you 14 tried to exit the room. 15 When I was talking here? 16 Q Mm-hmm. 17 That's not what I said. That's what happened. Α

And you never said that to any of the individuals Q that you were interviewed by following the incident, did you?

I don't remember. Again, a year and a half ago talking to multiple people, you are asking me to remember my conversation word for word, verbatim a year and a half ago with multiple people.

In fact, the recordings show that at some point, you ask to leave, and Owen's response was, "Go ahead and leave," right?

I don't think so. Α

Q Finally, the State admitted Plaintiff's 83, and that was the photograph of Maddie's room where it shows the location that you said you went to, between the bed, to get away from

A Because he had a gun pointed at us, and he already had beat me up at gunpoint, and he was saying things like "I hate you," with a gun pointed at me, "Fuck you. Fuck you. I hate you."

Q And at the bottom of that page, third line up, you also indicate, "He's going to kill my kids," to the 9-1-1 operator. Why did you tell the 9-1-1 operator that? What was going on at that point?

A Because he was waving the gun around first by the kids. And then, eventually, he pointed it right at them. I was separate. He didn't point it at me; he pointed it at the children, and I jumped in front of them.

That's when it's very evident that my child says, "I don't want to die," on the recording. Even at seven, he knows that if a gun is pointing at him, there is a chance he's going to die.

Q And I know this was a chaotic evening and you don't recall all of the pieces of what was going on exactly during each section of the 9-1-1, but you mentioned that, at some point, your son said, "I don't want to die." Do you recall at all what was happening when your son was making that comment?

A It's when he pointed the gun at the kids and I got in front of them and they hid behind me. That's what was going on right there because they were both trying to climb on top of
