Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact on the Courts

There are no changes in the PL version of the bill that would result in judicial impact.

1281 2SHB AMS differs from 1281 2SHB by changing the name of the account that is created in section 3. In the 1281 2SHB version the account created in section 3 is called the Internet Crimes Against Children Account. In 1281 2SHB AMS the name is changed to The Child Rescue Fund.

There is no change in judicial impact from the previous version.

2SHB 1281:

2SHB 1281 would add a section to RCW 9.68A to add a one thousand dollar fee to the existing penalties set forth in RCW 9.68A.070 for each depiction or image of visual or printed matter that constitutes a separate conviction when a person is convicted of violating RCW 9.68A.070. The fees would be collected by the clerk of the court and remitted to the state treasurer for deposit into the internet crimes against children account created in section 3 of the act.

Section 3 would create the internet crimes against children account that would be administered by the attorney general. Twenty-five percent of receipts to this account must be used for grants to child advocacy centers and seventy-five percent must be used for grants to the Washington internet crimes against children task force for use in investigations and prosecutions of crimes against children.

There is no judicial data to determine the potential revenue that would be generated by this legislation. All of the money received would go into a dedicated fund so there would be no cash receipt impact to the courts.

Existing Administrative Office of the courts resources would be used to make minimal modifications to the judicial information system to track the new penalties.
