Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact on the Courts

This bill primarily addresses the interaction between local and federal law enforcement concerning immigrants.

Section 9 contains a new action in superior court for a state resident to challenge law enforcement agencies and officials for failure to comply with the provisions of the bill. A finding of a violation requires a fine of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 per violation to be remitted to the Attorney General.

II. B - Cash Receipts Impact

There is no data to predict the number of successful suits under Section 9 of the bill and fine amounts ordered. The fines range between \$1,000 and \$5,000 and are payable to the Attorney General.

II. C - Expenditures

There is no data available to predict the number of civil actions in superior court that may occur under Section 9 of the bill. Any filings that proceed to trial are likely to be complex and potentially lengthy.

There is no data to predict the length or number of trials that may result under Section 9 of the bill. A trial of two weeks' duration would create an estimated expenditure impact of \$48,890. This includes judicial officer time and support staff time.
