### Part II: Narrative Explanation

This bill would add a new section to RCW 60 to create the Washington Wage Recovery Act.

The bill would create a lien for wage claims. A wage claim is a claim for any unpaid wages, and any other compensation, interest, statutory damages, liquidated damages, or statutory penalties owed for a violation of state or federal law.

The bill would provide that a wage lien may be foreclosed upon in superior or district courts, subject to jurisdictional limitations as defined in the bill, and authorizes a court to order property sale; allows for costs and fees in foreclosure action.

The bill would authorize courts to order a fine up to \$1,000.

**NOTE:** This bill differs from 1486 HB by clarifying that the county auditor, instead of the Department of Licensing, sets the filing fees and records the notices of wage liens on vehicles and vessels filed with the county auditor.

## Part II.A – Brief Description of what the Measure does that has fiscal impact on the Courts

Section 6 – Would provide that a wage lien may be foreclosed upon in Superior Court or District Courts, and authorizes a court to order property sale, and allows for order of costs and fees in foreclosure actions.

Section 7 – Defines release of the wage lien, and would authorize a fine of up to \$1,000 if the lien claimant acted unreasonably and in bad faith in refusing to file a release of the wage lien.

This bill could result in minimal impact to the courts due to potential for increased wage lien foreclosure actions. No data exists to estimate the amount of additional revenue from filing fees or the discretionary (up to \$1,000) civil fine created in Section 7, but it is expected to be minimal.

New account coding would be required. This could be managed within existing resources.
