Part II: Narrative Explanation

This bill would allow for a judge to consider a defendant's age, sophistication, and role in the crime as a mitigating factor when sentencing a minor in an adult court.

The bill would allow for a judge to impose certain sentencing enhancements concurrently when sentencing a minor in an adult court.

Part II.A – Brief Description of what the Measure does that has fiscal impact on the Courts

This bill would provide that when a minor is sentenced for a crime in an adult court, a judge would be allowed to consider the defendant's age, sophistication, and role in the crime as a mitigating factor. The bill would provide that a judge may allow an exceptional sentence below the standard range for the crime.

The bill would allow a judge to order certain sentence enhancements for a minor sentenced in an adult court to be served concurrently if serving those enhancements consecutively would result in an excessive sentence. This discretion would apply to the following:

- Firearm and deadly weapon enhancements;
- Vehicular homicide with a prior driving under the influence conviction enhancement;
- Sexual motivation enhancement;
- Drug offense in a protected zone enhancement;
- Manufacturing methamphetamine in front of a child enhancement; and
- Impaired driving offense committed with a child passenger under the age of sixteen years enhancement.
