Part II: Narrative Explanation

This bill would revise provisions governing a parent's obligation to provide medical support for a child under a child support order, including allowing a parent to meet the obligation by enrolling a child in public health care coverage.

The bill would require an employer or other business that has received a child support related income withholding order from the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) to remit payments through electronic funds transfer (EFT) if certain conditions apply.

The bill would adopt a new economic table for use in establishing child support obligations.

Part II.A – Brief Description of what the Measure does that has fiscal impact on the Courts

Section 301 – Would adopt a new economic table for use in establishing child support obligations.

II.B - Cash Receipt Impact

None.

II.C – Expenditures

Indeterminate, but could exceed \$50,000 per year.

Child support amounts are determined using a statutory child support schedule, which includes an economic table and child support worksheets developed by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC).

This bill would adopt the child support economic table recommended by the 2011 and 2015 Child Support Workgroups. Under the new economic table, the basic support obligation is based on the combined monthly net income of the parents and the number of children before the court.

Because the economic table has changed, it is possible that parents whose support obligations would change substantially will petition a court for a modification. While no data exists to predict how many actions this may create, it is possible that it could be enough to exceed \$50,000 per year in judicial time costs.
