## **Part II: Narrative Explanation**

This bill would prohibit the use of facial recognition technology by state and local government agencies until July 1, 2023. The bill would prohibit the installation or operation of any equipment that incorporates facial recognition in places of public accommodation until July 1, 2023. The bill would create a joint legislative task force on facial recognition to review existing research, document potential threats, and provide recommendations regarding appropriate regulation of facial recognition.

### **Part II.A – Brief Description of what the Measure does that has fiscal impact on the Courts**

Section 5 – Would provide that the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) may bring an action in the name of the state, or as *parens patriae* on behalf of persons residing in the state, to enforce this chapter. Would provide that in any action brought by the OAG would be subject to a civil penalty of one thousand dollars for each violation of this chapter. Would provide that any consumer prevailing in an action under this chapter may recover actual damages.
