Dear Washington State Supreme Court,

I am writing to ask you to please support reduced legal caseload standards. I am an investigator at King County Department of Public Defense. I love my job and doing my best work for our clients; however, current caseloads standards make it difficult to do more than the bare minimum in each case. We desperately need caseload relief.

These unsustainable caseload standards result in a poor quality of representation. It is my understanding that under the <u>current WSBA standards</u>, each public defense attorney is expected to handle as many as 150 felony cases or as many as 400 misdemeanor cases a year — a caseload that works out to, approximately, 13.3 hours per felony or 5 hours per misdemeanor.

Again, I love this work and feel a deep commitment to our clients and the pursuit of justice, but year after year of this unrelenting pressure is difficult to sustain. We are losing attorneys – often the best attorneys, the most effective and conscientious attorneys – in numbers I have never before seen in my 18 years working in public defense.

This work has always been challenging, but, especially now, with the advent of body-worn camera video and other new technologies, just doing a thorough review of discovery takes far longer than it did 10 years ago. I encourage you to support the new caseload standards to ensure that Washington State residents receive their 6th

Amendment rights.
